Asking the Right Questions: It's What Good Researchers Do...

For the next few weeks, you will be diving into extensive research regarding your topic of choice for this project. However, we can't just write an essay on the entire Holocaust or on tolerance/intolerance in general. We need to brainstorm things that we are **curious** about in relation to these topics.

For example, if my topic were <u>concentration camps</u> in general, three <u>specific</u> questions I would ask myself would be:

- 1. How did the concentration camps come about?
- 2. Whose idea were the concentration camps and how were they constructed?
- 3. How were prisoners treated in the concentration camps?
- 4. What were the *goals* of concentration camps?
- 5. How were people allowed to build these camps?

Then, when I go to do my research, I know I want to find sources that specifically discuss some/all of these things...
